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A Science Lesson in Your Own Back Yard


Frogs and toads are animals called amphibians. You may know that amphibians are animals that are born in the water, then when fully grown they live on the land but near the water. The life cycle of a toad begins as an egg, then grows into a tadpole, and finally grows into a toad.

One spring day in April my nephews and their Mom were taking a walk along a creek near their home. They noticed several toads near the shore sitting on the rocks and hanging out in the water. When they went to the water's edge, they were able to see something amazing right before their eyes!

Baby toads, in the form of eggs, were being laid by the female toad. Her abdomen was big and round because she was ready to give birth. When she laid her eggs there were hundreds of them connected in a long strand. You can see a close-up picture of the eggs below.

During a period of about two weeks, the eggs will grow into tadpoles. As time goes by the tadpoles will get a little longer each day. Eventually they will grow back legs, followed by front legs, and finally develop into a toad!

This is an amazing transformation from living and breathing in the water, to being able to live and breath on land. All a part of God's design for amphibians. Isn't God's creation awesome! There is a short video you can enjoy online at *Britannica.com* that shows the life cycle of an amphibian.

This "W" shape will be the frog.




Draw eyes on the frog (or glue on googly eyes).




Cut out a long tongue from red paper and glue the

end of it in the frog's mouth.




Put your thumb in the frog's lower jaw, and put your other fingers in the upper jaw. You now have a frog puppet that has a VERY big mouth!
